RESTRICTIONS AND THE WAR EFFORT



GOD SAVE THE

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DECEMBER 1916 To increase the output of home grown food and to reduce dependence on imports Earby Urban District Council urged residents to apply for allotment plots.

By JANUARY 1917 80 applications had been received for allotments in Rostle Top, Red Lion Street and School Lane.

MARCH 29th 1917 The Earby Allotment Holders and **Cottage Gardeners Association was formed.**

RECREATION GROUND was ploughed over and planted by children from New Road School with peas potatoes, cabbages, salad crops, onions, and beans.

AUGUST 1917

A maximum uniform price was fixed for foods such as meat, butter, cheese, lard, sugar, tea, coffee, milk, sweets, chocolate, jams, oats and oatmeal, dried peas and beans.

COAL was restricted to the number of rooms in a house.

SEPTEMBER 1917

Potatoes and sugar were limited and the people had to apply to their Local Food Committee for a sugar card and register with a grocer

JANUARY 1918

Sugar became rationed

APRIL 1918

Meat, butter, cheese, margarine became rationed

RATION CARDS were issued and all had to register with a butcher and grocer

DORA amended to include one meatless day per week

"DOUSE YOUR LIGHTS."

Lights in Houses, Shops, and other places must be obscured from one hour after sunset (solar time) to half an hour before sunrise (solar time).

FOR THE WEEK ENDING JULY 15th all lights must be obscured after 10 25 p.m.

Lighting Restrictions

By 8th August 1914 the whole nation was under the jurisdiction of the Defence of the Realm Act (DORA).

This was added to as the War progressed but when it was introduced it stated

- no-one was allowed to talk about naval or military matters in public places no-one was allowed to spread rumours about military matters
- no-one was allowed to buy binoculars
- no-one was allowed to trespass on railway lines or bridges
- no-one was allowed to melt down gold or silver
- no-one was allowed to light bonfires or fireworks
- no-one was allowed to give bread to horses or chickens no-one was allowed to use invisible ink when writing abroad
- no-one was allowed to buy brandy or whiskey in a railway refreshment room
- no-one was allowed to ring church bells the government could take over any factory or workshop
- the government could try any civilian breaking these laws

DECEMBER 1916

Ministry of Food created to regulate supply and consumption of food and encourage greater food production

From October 1915 swedes, turnips, potatoes, cabbages, rhubarb were grown at the re-modelled Earby sewage works and sold to public

Kilner Jars were made available for fruit bottling NATIONAL SERVICE

Mr.Lloyd George's Grave Words—

"The Nation may have to choose between diminishing its military effort and underfeeding its population."


TIME TABLE.

- 1. Last day for distribution of forms to householders by local Post O ffices, Saturday, September 29th. 2. Last day for receipt of applications from Public, Saturday, October 6th.
- 3. Last day for issue of Sugar Registration Cards to Public, October 26th.
- 4. Last day for Retailers to receive Sugar Registration Cards from the Public, Monday, November 5th. 5. Date as from when distribution throughout the trade is entirely regulated, Sunday, December 30th.

Any further particulars may be obtained at the Offices, or any of the Grocery Branches.

In 1916 the Government began to issue war bonds as a way of raising money to help fund the war effort. Savings products in the form of saving stamps, certificates and bonds were sold to the public and the money was sent to the Government. National and local War Savings Committees were formed throughout the land.

The best efforts of the Earby Committee centred on Aeroplane Week in June 1918 when £21,640 was raised from the local people of Earby, Kelbrook, Thornton and Salterforth
